MEET OUR MEMBERS



Pam Mathison-Levitt joined WFLF to connect with local writers, learn strategies for a successful writing life, to share work and to gain support. Pam was

published in the 2021 Emerald Coast Review (ECR) and read her work at the October open mic. After that "kind and supportive experience," Pam officially joined WFLF.

Pam is married and homeschools her two children. The family has two guinea pigs, and she has been known to have temporary animals for educational purposes, such as observing anoles and butterflies. During COVID-19, Pam coordinated a virtual homeschool co-op where she taught workshops in poetry writing and fiction focused on character development, setting and plot. Pam's kids also enjoy writing.

Two threads have always run through Pam's life: writing and teaching. She began journal writing at age 9. She's compelled to create and express emotions through her work and says, "Although I feel tremendous vulnerability in sharing my work, I really love that feeling when I share a poem or essay with someone, and it resonates emotionally. Connecting with others over a shared experience

expressed through the written word is such a powerful moment."

Pam also uses writing as a way to process her experiences with chronic illness and disability. She has written and impacted others who face health challenges. She empowers herself by using her struggles to lift up others while expanding compassion and understanding. Her writing goals are focusing on "doing the next write thing" and following a very intuitive writing path as it unfolds. She plans to build a more disciplined and frequent writing practice through NaPoWriMo and the WFLF November writing challenge. Pam has been published in the following publications: The Anthology of Appalachian Writers: Bobbie Ann Mason Volumes III and V, Fluent Magazine, Good Shepherds Good Town newspaper and Emerald Coast Review 21. SUBMISSION GUIDELINES:

- 1. Submit a collection or sequence of original poems not to exceed 30 pages/poems.
- 2. The author's name should not appear anywhere in the manuscript or anywhere in the file.



- 3. All submissions are kept anonymous to the judge. Manuscripts should be typed, with pages numbered and formatted with easy-to-read font.
- 4. Please provide a title page and table of contents.
- 5. Poems that have been published elsewhere are NOT eligible for submission. Please note that the

- 30-page limit does not include title page or table of contents.
- 6. File name should be the title of the submitted manuscript. Only .DOCX and .DOC files are accepted.

SUBMISSION AGREEMENT

When you submit to the WFLF Poem-A-Day Chapbook Contest and/or publish with the WFLF, here is what you are agreeing to:

- First serial rights. We accept simultaneous submissions, but if your work is accepted elsewhere, we ask you to let us know as soon as possible so we can withdraw your application.
- 2. If your body of work is accepted and published, rights revert back to you.
- You grant us non-exclusive re-print rights. We may utilize parts of your work for promotional materials, for example, to market our next contest
- Publication of your work by the WFLF is subject to a contract between you the author and WFLF the publisher
- 5. Chapbook should be published in time for books sales/promo during April 2022, National Poetry Month.

NOTE: Writers will be notified the status of their manuscript via email. Due to the high

volume of applications, we are not able to provide feedback at this time.

WFLF at the 2021 Great Gulfcoast Arts Festival

Ten authors and WFLF combined at the 2021 Great Gulfcoast Arts Festival (Heritage Arts) to make 80 sales totaling over \$1300. After deducting \$200 for the booth fee, WFLF made \$135 on sales of the *Emerald Coast Review XXI* and other books from past years. We also gave out dozens of free books to both child and adult festival goers.

Sales reports and checks have been sent out to all selling authors. The booth was provided by WFLF to our members at no charge. Our top selling author was Michele Le Blanc with 20 sales, while the topselling title was Lost Scrolls of Archimedes by Tom Roberts.

Most importantly, our presence at GGAF exposed WFLF to the general public and to local writers—whether current or aspiring—and gained us recognition as a local organization supporting writers. We hope to see many of the writers join our organization.

First, second and third place will be awarded cash prizes of \$100, \$50, and \$25.

MENTIONS

Honorable mentions will receive certificates of merit. Winning memoirs will be published in West Florida Literary Federation's electronic newsletter, *The Legend*, which will be emailed to winners and WFLF members. Winners will be announced at the Federation's annual meeting in Pensacola, Florida, which is scheduled for February 2022.

Entries will be accepted beginning January 1, through midnight, January 31, 2022.







Writing for Your Website

Few of us may ever achieve J.K. Rowling or John Grisham writing success levels, but we can try! Most of us will not only write books, but we also will create and manage our own

websites on which to promote our work. If you have a website, here are some considerations for good web content:

You can't trick readers onto your site simply by using key words. Your words must be used in a meaningful, authentic way. Readers—and algorithms—can tell when you are forcing specific words into your content for the sake of search engine optimization (SEO). The best way to achieve this is to be an expert on your topic. Be honest. Share something of value.

Use plain language or words that the average person searches by on the internet. Otherwise, it's highly likely no one will find your website unless it's by accident.

Write short. Web readers are "skimmers." According to Seattleu.edu, a web reader

only consumes about 20% of the content on a page, so write short paragraphs, about 5 sentences long. Also write relatively short sentences, no more than 20 words long. Use bullets, lists and headers. Questions often work well as headlines.

Write a clear call-to-action. For instance, if you want someone to email you, sign up for a newsletter, attend a book signing or click on a link to buy your book, make that clear on the page.

Use hyperlinks. Linking meaningful content throughout content pages will keep readers on your site, exploring and learning more about you.

Use active voice and speak directly to the reader in second person language.

It's not as sexy as a romance novel or as exhilarating as a thriller, but writing good web content serves a purpose. It can help you promote your work, and it lends credibility to you as a writer.

Nominations for the 2022 WFLF Board

It's that time of year. Nominations are now being accepted for the following open positions on the 2022 West Florida Literary Federation board.

Positions become open when the term of an incumbent board member expires or the member resigns. Current members of WFLF may nominate a member for an open position by submitting the name of the member by email to our nominating chair, Debra Stogner at: debrastogner@gmail.com. Include "WFLF Board Nominations" in the subject line of your email, which should be sent by February 1, 2022.

Please check with an individual before nominating him or her for one of the open positions.

To quote from our bylaws:

"All officers shall be nominated by membership and elected by ballot at the annual meeting by a majority of members of the Federation present and voting. Only those officers who have signified their consent to serve if elected shall be nominated."

"The officers of the Federation shall consist of a President, Vice President, Secretary, and Treasurer. Terms of office for officers shall be two (2) years. No officer may serve more than two consecutive terms in office."

"Directors shall be nominated and elected by the general membership of the Federation." "A term of office for a director is two (2) years. Directors may be reelected to subsequent terms, but may not serve more than two (2) consecutive terms."


