Open Mic

Genre hopping from theater director and playwright to fiction writer, to children's book author, Pat Gould has learned a lot. The world of theater helped her create solid characters, vivid scenes, and strong dialogue. During November Open Mic, Pat will share techniques with the group and lead exercises to help strengthen character development and bring your stories to life! Please join us for the presentation "Bending Genres."

Pat Black-Gould has been a member of WFLF for three and a half years. She has a diverse background that includes a career as an author, director, playwright, producer, and clinical/neuropsychologist. Her short stories have been published in literary journals and anthologies including The Emerald Coast Review, Jewish Fiction.net, Panoplyzine, and Red Penguin Press.

Pat is currently publishing her first children's book, "The Crystal Beads, Lalka's Journey" with Purple Butterfly Press. The story follows a little girl in 1939 Poland, who is forced to give up her Star of David in exchange for a rosary. The Crystal Beads was first published as a short story. It won first place in the National League of American Pen's Women's Flannery O'Connor Short Story Competition, and first place in a PEN Women Florida statewide competition.



Currently, along with co-author Steve Hardiman, the team is writing their first novel. "Limbo of the Moon," is a coming-ofage story that takes place during the Vietnam War era. A chapter from the novel was recently published by Red Penguin Press in the authors' first historical fiction anthology.

As a psychologist/neuropsychologist, Pat specialized in working with Veterans, the Culturally Deaf population and the LGBTQ+ community. Under her maiden

name, Patricia Black, she and co-writer, Dr. Neil Glickman have published in the field of Mental Health and Deafness. In the theater world, Pat ran a theater company in New York and an in inner-city children's theater program for children. She also directed and produced summer stock theater in Maine and wrote several murder mysteries that were performed throughout New England. In addition, Pat was also a professional mime, something that embarrasses her son, Zach, whenever she mentions it.

Pat chose to join WFLF because she wanted to connect with a local writing community and was impressed with our group. Pat is part of an international family. Her husband, Patrick, is from Ireland and her son, Zach, lives in Melbourne, Australia. She can't wait to get back to traveling, especially to Australia to see her son. Pat has a cat named Fionn that she calls "Finn." Her favorite genres are playwriting, adult fiction and children's books.

We look forward to sharing Pat's knowledge and experience with our community of writers.

A Review



IN OUR WRITE MINDS

Ever heard of the writer, Evelyn Ryan? She supported her large family by winning the jingle writing contests of the 1950s. *The Prize Winner of Defiance*, *Ohio* is a 2005 movie starring Julianne Moore and Woody Harrelson that tells

the story of her talent, courage and perseverance against the odds. It may inspire you to take a deep breath and click **Send**, entering your screenplay, song, book, poem, essay, article, story or chapbook in that contest you've been researching. What, as they say, have you got to lose? In most cases, only a modest fee, and some contests are free to enter. Competitions for every genre abound, sponsored by literary journals, mainstream magazines, newspapers, university English departments, MFA programs, author conferences, agencies for the arts and non-profit organizations for writers.

Past publishing history and bios heavy with credentials are not considered when judges read "blind." Work submitted must stand on its own merit, giving novice writers a fighting chance. In addition to a monetary award, contests offer the opportunity to increase media exposure, win public recognition for your work, form relationships with colleagues and editors and add to your publishing credits. Author Holly Lyn Walrath suggests that the odds of winning may relate to the genre you write. Does the widely known international contest you're considering allow each entrant to submit five poems? Is there only one prize, of a thousand dollars but your entry fee is \$30? Hmmm... Remember, whether you are entering a contest or submitting for publication, guidelines are *sacred*. Read them carefully and repeatedly, and try to get an idea of the general aesthetic for which the judges and sponsors are looking. Consider also, what happens to your fee-will it fund writing projects and grants, humanitarian or environmental causes that are important to you, support journals and non-profits that benefit you and fellow writers? When contemplating contests, it pays, literally and figuratively, to do your homework before you hit Send. Good luck, break a leg, buena suerte, go get 'em!

ECR Launches


21st edition Includes Record Number of Regional Writers and Artists

The West Florida Literary Federation (WFLF) released its 21st Emerald Coast Review (ECR) featuring a record number of writers and artists from Baldwin, Alabama to Escambia, Santa Rosa and as far as Gulf County, Florida. This anthology has been published biannually since 1989. The publication features quality fiction, nonfiction, poetry, contemporary, emerging, and experimental works along with the best of art, graphic design and photography from area writers and artists living along coastal Florida and Alabama.

Managing editor of the ECR, Diane Skelton, said in the anthology's foreword: "The effects of COVID-19 and quarantine on the creative spirit will be researched by psychologists, sociologists, and historians for decades to come. However, if they were to open this 21st volume of the Emerald Coast Review, and read these 83 pieces of prose, poetry and art, they would agree the creative spirit is thriving in our coastal region and beyond. Writers and artists answered the call for submissions for this ECR in remarkable numbers, offering exceptional work. Perhaps it was a result of the emotional roller coaster caused by a pandemic, the opportunity to create offered by a lockdown, or the urge to release pent-up frustrations, but this volume is like no other in scope."

Common themes in this anthology include life and love, death and disaster, nature and beauty, injustice and inequality. From tales of the homeless and the haunted, to poignant pieces reflecting life in the time of COVID, the reader travels with the writer to imaginary and real places. Whether it's taking a literary walk,

digging through the aftermath of a hurricane, marveling at ripples of sand, or tending a dying patient, the words and images captivate and immerse the reader. In the final section of the book, local student poetry winners from Escambia and Santa Rosa counties are featured from the WFLF youth writing committee contest that was held in April in conjunction with National Literacy Week to promote creativity and student writing.

Members of WFLF and contributors to the ECR attended a virtual launch of the 21st anthology on Oct. 19 on Zoom. In all, 13 readers and artists showcased their pieces from the book. More than 30 attendees participated in the event. Here's how you can purchase a copy:


